They'd squeezed in to watch VE80! A celebration of VE day by Stutton Presents with a script by Louise Fryer and Musical Direction by Maria King. It took the form of Stutton's home guard - which bore a striking resemblance to Capt. Mainwaring's platoon in Dad's Army - putting together their own celebration which featured monologues and songs popular during the war, rendered with enthusiasm and plenty of Blitz spirit. These included solo spots and some fabulous close harmony numbers by Stutton's answer to the Andrews sisters - the "Adnams Sisters." There were some serious moments too, as Gay Strutt and Janet Lock, who were there at the time, reminisced about the war and the original VE Day celebrations. The audience were on hand to join in popular favourites such as the hokey cokey which got everyone up and dancing. There are too many people who worked tirelessly on lighting, costumes, make up, props and publicity to list them all here but you know who you are - Stutton Presents thanks you. As you read this, summer is well and truly under way. One of my favourite hobbies is Birdwatching, and I am a member of the Stour Estuary bird news WhatsApp group. It is astounding just how many rare and unusual birds fly over this part of Suffolk - we are really fortunate! I always find it stunning that something as fragile as a chiff chaff which only weighs about 8g (about 1/3 oz) flies from Southern Europe or even North Africa each year, and they may well do this 6 or 7 times during their life time.

As you will know St Peter's Stutton recently gained its Silver Eco Church Award, which is a real achievement. It means that we are trying to look after our natural environment and to improve our use of energy and our impact on the planet. This is vital work, and is an important part of our Christian Presence in the community - an eco friendly (and perhaps slightly wilder) church yard will help support the insect population which birds like Chiff Chaffs rely on to survive. We are happy for you to keep family graves clear, but you may well find that the grass is longer in other parts of the church yard - we hope that it will encourage both flora and fauna. Please look out for other eco initiatives.

On a more obviously church based note, when I wrote last time, Oliver Kemsley was about to be licensed to the Benefice. I am pleased to say that he is settling in well, and you may well find him taking services at Stutton in the near future. Welcome to the latest update from the Parish Council, including the annual Parish meeting.



Some exciting work is coming to increase road safety on Holbrook Road, please see my update in a separate article. The Annual Parish meeting went well with reports from local groups, thanks to Cllr Ollie Brazill for chairing in my absence.

After some issues around actual locations being given to Emergency Services (in Woolverstone), Cllr Leach suggested we post What3Words (https://what3words.com/) location posters for our defibrillator in the bus shelter and notice board. The Council have also purchased new defibrillator pads whilst the faulty light has been repaired.

This time in planning we recommended refusal for the conversion of 2 dwellings into one on Woodfield Lane on grounds of loss of a dwelling. Other applications were approved, namely a new gate/shingle path in Church Field Road and an extension on Manningtree Road.

The Council decided not to locate a newly bought dog-waste bin, especially as the emptying price has risen again. The new bin instead will be used to replace the broken dog bin at Lewis Lane, thanks to Cllr Mike Hems for taking this not very pleasant task on!

Cllr Hems has also secured cycling on the Greenway for the foreseeable future with owner's consent being obtained now the 12-month trial period has passed without issues. Thanks Mike! We are hoping to get the Parish Council grass cutting started ASAP and are contacting our contractor.

This year's village clean had about 20 volunteers collecting litter around the village, fortunately there wasn't too much around, which is excellent. Thanks to all the volunteers and to Cllr John Pallant for organising. Some fly-tipping down the Drift has been reported to RHS whom own the land.

A reminder that with the current refurbishment of the Co-op in Holbrook, the Community Shop will be available for all the essentials. Opening times are in the Roundabout and on the village website.

The next Parish Council meeting is at the Community Hall garden room on Monday 9th June, starting at 19:30. Do please come along if you can, all really are welcome!

I want to concentrate on Anti-social behaviour for the topic of this article. What does it look like? Where can it occur? Who does it effect? ASB is a range of actions which can cause someone alarm, harassment and distress and annoyance. This can be to individuals or communities. It can occur in homes as well as in the public. It can affect anyone and everyone. It is often exacerbated with the change in weather.

Here are some examples of what I'm seeing in and around my patch:

- · Breaking into derelict buildings and vandalism
- Off road motorbikes riding on land without permission and when confronted- being abusive
- Smoking cannabis in public gardens- especially as the weather is nicer now, the smell is potent and unpleasant
- · Vehicle meets and racing, generally with loud exhausts.
- Deliberately starting fires
- Drunk and disorderly behaviour
- Use of inappropriate language/shouting

These are just a few, I could keep writing but I'm on a limited word count. You will see that some of these will fall into the criminal realm as well.

This type of behaviour has often been going on for years, the off-road motorbikes that are ridden in Bobbits Lane, Pinewood (edge of Ipswich) for example, it is not an easy fix to stop it.

There is often a cross over in which agency is more appropriate to deal with the issue and I work very closely with the community safety team at Babergh and Mid Suffolk District council. If you are wanting to report ASB then I urge you to report it to both the Police and the Council. If you are a tenant, then your housing provider. If its regarding school children, please let the school know. Sometimes we don't know our actions are causing upset to someone else. Please pause and think, how would I feel if the situation was reversed?

Road Safety News

In a drive to improve road safety in Stutton, the Parish Council are working with Suffolk Highways and County Councillor Simon Harley to improve road safety on Holbrook Road, around the school. Following on-site meetings improvements are to be carried out on lines, signs and repairs to barriers. In detail, the approved plans are to:

- Repair the damaged safety barrier outside the school
- Refresh the hazard centre marking lines on the S-bend
- Refresh the 2 x existing advisory slow markings and replace the bend warning sign plate
- Carry out a comprehensive speed survey

Pending the outcome of the survey, additional "30" and "SLOW" road markings may be applied on the approach to Larksfield.

The cost of these improvements are being shared between the 3 parties and I'd like to thank Cllr Harley for his financial support in Stutton. The works are expected to create a safer traffic environment on Holbrook Road for not only the children & parents at the school, but all users of the road and pavement. Work should start during the summer. Special thanks to Siobhain Bruneau for the pressure and hard work about the state of the safety barrier! **Cllr Darren Cooper**

It has been a busy start to the Summer Term and we have recently been enjoying the wonderful sunshine! The children recently took part in the VE day celebrations, they enjoyed a 'tea party' at snack time whilst listening to music from the 1940's. They also decorated some bunting and made aeroplanes which were launched in the garden!

We are super excited to be welcoming 5 caterpillars into setting next week. The children (and staff) will watch their transformation over the coming weeks and will also be reading the Hungry Caterpillar book, exploring life cycles and the natural world.

It is around this time of year that we begin preparations for our summer production. This year, the children will be performing "Croak" to all parents/carers on Sunday 6th July at Stutton Young Explorers. Further details on purchasing tickets will be released at the start of June.

This term we are also looking at 'school preparation' and working closely with local schools to ensure the children are well prepared and all runs smoothly. We plan to visit Stutton Primary School to experience a school setting where we may even get time to play!

For those who don't know, Stutton has its very own Forest School located in the community woods, behind the playing field. The Forest School is run by our Charity (Constable Country Childcare) and will be open in September on a Tuesday and Thursday from 9.00am to 3.00pm. Earlier and later childcare can be facilitated at the Stutton Young Explorers setting and the children are walked from/to the forest with qualified members of staff.

Research has suggested that for every one-word children learn inside the nursery, four are learnt via outside learning! If you would be interested in enrolling your child to attend Forest School on one or both days, we will be present in the Forest behind the community shop on Saturday 7th June from 9-12 for parents/carers and children to come and visit, see the site and find out more! Forest school costs £51 per day (£8.50 an hour).

A reminder to all, we provide before and after school care for children attending Stutton primary school and care and education for children aged 4 months to 5 years. In the District Council Calendar, the annual council meeting in May is the point at which "musical" chairs take place. This is the meeting when the Chair and Vice Chair of the Council are elected and the Chairs and Vice Chairs of the major committees are also elected for the forthcoming year. Over the past year I have chaired the Overview & Scrutiny Committee & Joint Overview & Scrutiny Committee and apart from one year, have been privileged to undertake that role over a few years. Being a chairman is hard work as doing one's homework is essential to having a successful meeting.

Reports on the financial cost of Climate Change Services, A Review of Waste Services and the Implementation of Simpler Recycling, a Review of the New Car Parking Charges, a re-visit to Pre-Planning Application advice and Accessibility of Written Documents are all scheduled for the forthcoming year.

I would like to highlight a new and innovative report - The Regulator of Social Housing is requiring Councils who provide Council Housing to demonstrate that they are listening to their tenants and are providing opportunity for the tenants to highlight areas of concern and are actively responding to those concerns. The Regulator is also asking for evidence that Tenants have a voice that is evidenced by minutes and action. There is a well-established Tenant Board (The Chair of that Board lives in Stour Ward) and in the past year they have implemented their own Scrutiny Function which will review in- depth concerns raised by other Tenants. They undertook the revision of the new Tenant Handbook which is now complete and available and undertook an in-depth investigation of Anti-Social Behaviour affecting Tenants and how that is managed. Their forthcoming scrutiny activity for the new fiscal year 2025-2026 will concentrate on Complaints.

Another Committee which I attend is the Joint Audit and Standards Committee which meets 3 monthly. This Committee consists of 10 members from both Districts. Ensuring that the risk of Fraud and Corruption is managed within both councils and is overseen and undertaken by the Head of Service for Internal Audit.

Residents already know about my SCC Health Scrutiny Committee commitment however I also attend as an observer on the West Suffolk Hospital Future Systems Board (The New West Suffolk Hospital Project Team) and as an observer on the Ipswich Citizens Advice Board. **Mary.McLaren@babergh.gov.uk**

The Night Sky this month - Mike Haynes

Some of you may have seen or heard a news item recently suggesting that a new planet had been found in the Solar System. Ever since the chance discovery of Uranus by William Herschel in 1781, astronomers have speculated about the presence of planets further out from the Sun. Unusual behaviour in the orbit of Uranus eventually led to predictions of such a planet and in 1846

Neptune was discovered pretty much where expected. Subsequently Percy Lowell (seen opposite using one of the large early telescopes) proposed the Planet X hypothesis which suggested that a further planet existed beyond Neptune that was causing irregularities in the orbits of both Neptune and Uranus. The discovery of Pluto in 1930 seemed to vindicate this hypothesis but data from the Voyager 2 mission in 1989 clearly showed that errors in the calculations of the orbit of Uranus were to blame. In



recent years many small icy bodies have been discovered orbiting well beyond Pluto and we now believe that there are tens of thousands (or more) such bodies, known as transneptunian objects (TNOs) In 2017 a couple of astronomers suggested that the orbits of 6 such TNOs were being influenced by a so-called Planet 9. One significant feature of modern astronomy is the number of telescopes devoted to carrying out various forms of sky surveys, providing huge amounts of data on the positions of millions of objects from stars to planets and asteroids. A consequence of these surveys is that comparing images of the same piece of sky taken at different times will show up anything that changes, such as objects that move, like planets and comets, or brighten like supernovae explosions. The recent announcement was from an examination of images from two separate surveys 23 years apart which found 13 possible objects of interest orbiting the Sun way beyond Pluto. After further analysis they honed in on one strong candidate for the elusive planet. However, this is not the end; science demands far more evidence before conclusions can be drawn so the team will use another telescope to try to verify, or not, their initial findings. Fingers crossed but I am not holding my breath!
