Since the last Newsletter we have been working with a Design Consultancy company and a Landscape Architect to help us create policy for the Neighbourhood Plan. We want to ensure that any future development bids have to sit well within the village, but more - they also need to actively enhance it.

"Neighbourhood Plans ... play a crucial role, introducing required design guides and codes - to provide certainty and reflect local character and preferences about the form and appearance of development".

Everything we're doing to develop the Neighbourhood Plan is informed by what you, the residents of our village, have already told us you value about the village - what you want to preserve, and how you see any future development. We will be asking for your views on the draft Plan before the Plan is formally put to a Referendum in the village. Working with the Landscape Architect we have identified these views as important to the character of the village.


